Q & A

How do we support teachers as we face long-term school closures?

One thing we need to give serious attention to is the well-being of our teachers. Ultimately, they determine the success of VIL in meeting the academic and social/emotional needs of their students. The pressure of all of this cannot be overstated. As you review your VIL plan, consider ways to streamline it so that you maintain quality while simplifying implementation. I have heard many ideas to accomplish both, including:

- Have a schedule that allows certain subjects to be addressed on alternating days.
- Allow for flexibility in deadlines. Some families have multiple children and few devices. Being flexible with remove stress for teachers and families.
- Be creative. How about making a day this week "specials" day (focusing on physical exercise, art, and music) that doesn't depend on technology? Students could keep a log (journal, take or draw pictures, music that makes them happy) of the activities. They could create a video of their activities that could be posted and shared. The possibilities are endless, but the real benefit would be a break for students, parents, and teachers trying to navigate the logistics of VIL.
- Focus on prayer.
- Focus on positivity.
- Focus on relationships.

The Wisconsin DPI has posted the following *Age & Developmental Learning Guidelines for Digital Learning*:

The <u>Wisconsin Model Early Learning Standards Guiding Principles</u> provide important guidelines for instructional design for our youngest learners. Core principles include: a child's early learning and development is multidimensional; expectations for children must be guided by knowledge of child growth and development, and children learn through play and the active exploration of their environment. **Some districts are creating non-digital learning options for early learners, which is allowable as the communication with parents and guardians helps to bridge home and school learning.**
