

## Jubilee 2025 PILGRIMS OF HOPE

## What is a Jubilee Year?

A jubilee is a special holy year of grace and pilgrimage in the Catholic Church. It typically takes place once every 25 years, though the pope can call for extraordinary jubilee years more often, such as in the case of the 2016 Year of Mercy or the 2013 Year of Faith.

The Catholic Jubilee Year, established in 1300 by Pope Boniface VIII, is rooted in the Jewish tradition of releasing prisoners, forgiving debts, and restoring harmony every 50 years. During the Jubilee, Catholics can receive plenary indulgences, which remove the temporal punishment for sins already forgiven. These indulgences can also be offered by the living for the relief of souls in purgatory.

### What is the timeline of the Jubilee Year?

Jubilee Year 2025 began on Christmas Eve, 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. It will end with the closing of that Holy Door on January 6, 2026, the Solemnity of the Epiphany. The Jubilee Year in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee opened on Sunday, December 29, at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist.
